




Site Descriptions

North Bank

NS 89 SW 14

NS 8271 9490

MANOR NEUK, earthwork,

Indefinite records exist of what may have been a small square earthwork in the vicinity of Manor Castle. There was no evidence of an earthwork in this vicinity in 1973 (OS) and this survey could not locate it.

MANOR NEUK, house, 16th century

Date visited: 23/2/96

The remains of the house is located c 70 yards north of the level crossing, east of Manor Neuk Farm. Turf and rubble are all that is visible. The general measurements of the area are: 22m east/west and 12m north/south. Foundation lines are still visible through the turf. A section of wall which may be associated with the site, is visible in the bank of a burn which flows next to the site. This section of wall measures 5m by 2m. There is no sign of NS 89 SW 14 (an earthwork) which was supposedly located nearby.

RIVER FORTH, CAMBUSKENNETH, rampart (possible)

Date visited: 23/2/96

The rampart supposedly spanned the Forth to the east of Cambuskenneth Abbey. The 1st ed OS map indicates the location of the Abbey Ford just south of this location which utilises a mid-stream bank of gravel. There is nothing visible in the banks on either side of river at this point.

CAMBUSKENNETH ABBEY, Abbey

Date visited: 23/2/96

The Abbey is located at the southern end of Cambuskenneth village. The site is in the care of Historic Scotland. There are no changes to the NMR description. A 'Ruin' and structural remains, marked on the 1st ed OS map, lie outside the Abbey. The remains of the eastern and northern walls of an orchard, also seen on the 1865 map, are still visible immediately to the south of the Abbey.

CAMBUSKENNETH, crop mark

A dark three sided rectangular crop mark encloses an area of about 70m square. It is seen on 1946 aerial photographs, centred on this grid reference. The feature appears to be open to the east, but this is obscured by a field boundary, and probably extends into the adjoining field. The southern edge of the feature respects the north bank of the Forth The width of the crop mark is too great for a ploughed-out field boundary, and may be a deep ditch. It may be contemporary with Cambuskenneth Abbey, but it may also be earlier. This feature was also seen on 1988 aerial photographs beneath ploughed land. The OS map of 1865 shows no field boundaries at this location and the present boundaries are modern.

CAMBUSKENNETH, ford (possible) or pier

Date visited: 23/2/96

A mound of large stones are visible in the river bank and on the river bed immediately west of Hood Farm buildings, c 200m south of Cambuskenneth Bridge. This feature extends c 2m into the river and c 4m along the river bank. Nothing is visible in the bank on the other side of the river.

A whetstone was found at the Ferry Orchard, Cambuskenneth, reported in 1914. There is no further information.

The sword was found in 1832 or 1833 when lowering the floor of an old weaving shop at Cambuskenneth. The sword is now lost. There is no further information.

The medieval ring was found at Cambuskenneth and donated to RMS in 1970. There is no further information.

This pier is marked on the 1st editions OS maps at Ladyneuk. Three courses of stone wall are visible above low tide level. The pier measures 6m by 3m. It is now disused and in a ruinous and overgrown condition.

Listed Building, category A

Only surviving glass cone in Scotland c 1825 (HBD listings). The glass cone is situated within the grounds of United Glass (Alloa Glass Works). No changes to the NMR description were noted.

The site is located on the river bank at the end of a footpath which continues from Forth Street, Cambus. A semi-circular stone base has been built into the river bank. This stone base measures 1m by 0.5m and rises c 1m above the water. It has two notches on its top surface, c 0.10m deep. It is surrounded by similar stone, rubble and wooden posts which cover an area of 5m - 6m along the river bank. The north side of the river bank is man-made at this point and there is a footpath running along the top and a basin-like depression in the ground. A rectangular stone kerb lies at the southern end of this depression. The whole area is very overgrown. The 1st ed 0S map shows the location of a crane at this location.

Note also that the 1st edition OS map shows a pier and harbour at NS 858 933 which were undetected during the survey

HAUGH, earthwork, pier, 18th century

Date visited: 23/2/96

A pier was located at the mouth of the Devon in 1793. In 1971 timbers were visible and an earthwork on the left bank was thought to have been of some industrial use. During this survey nothing was visible on the ground and there were no signs of the timbers. The 1st edition OS map does not show any structure or enclosure here.

The area is strewn with fragments of stone and brickwork. The field in which the building is located produced a number of pieces of possibly worked flint.

The site is located on the rivers edge, c 100-200m east of Fallin school. The disused limekiln is a square, stone structure, the lower part of which is built in a stepped platform manner. The building is in a ruinous condition and the remaining parts of structure are cracked and weathered.

The concrete block is located c 100m east of the eastern edge of Fallin on the river bank. It measures 5m by 3m and is 3m high. The block has two openings on its top surface, one circular and one rectangular. The circular opening is surrounded by a concrete wall type effect. The block may be a sewage outlet.

The pill box is located to the west of Bandeath Industrial Estate, c 200m east of Alton Farm. This is a brick structure with concrete roof and floor. It has a passageway entrance at the northern end and three window slots, two square and one oblong. It measures c 3m by 2m and is 2.5m high. The pill box lies near three other possibly related brick structures. The structure is showing signs of weathering and cracking.

The pier piles are in a severely rotted condition.

The metal parts of the bridge supports are exposed to continuous weathering and are corroding. The rail bridge was in use as such in 1946.

SOUTH ALLOA, wooden posts,

Wooden piles are located along the shore at South Alloa immediately west of South Alloa pier. There are three rows of wooden posts running east-west along the shore, below high tide. They run for c 200m and are generally in a severely rotted and weathered condition. They presumably relate to the several jettys seen at this location on the 1st edition OS map.

The piers and slipways are located at South Alloa and across the Forth below Alloa Glass Works. The stone pier at South Alloa is $c \, 3m$ - 4m high on its northern side. A row of wooden posts are visible at the south-east end of the pier. The pier appears to be still in use. Remains of a stone pier or slipway are visible on the north side of the river at Alloa. The structures are suffering from a certain amount of disrepair.

KENNETPANS, harbour (possible)

Date visited: 24/2/96

The site is located on the banks of the Forth at a natural inlet at Kennetpans. Remains of wooden piles are visible on the east and west sides running north/south. Those on the east side are 3-4m long. The remains of two walls also run along the east and west sides. This harbour has silted up considerably with mud. The wooden piles are rotten and the stone is weathered. The site is generally overgrown. The 1st edition OS map shows structural elements on both sides of this harbour as well as a tramway leading to this harbour from Kilbagie chemical and manure works.

The southern building is a long one storey cottage joined to a two storey house which is in turn joined to another one storey cottage. All have red tiling and appear to have been recently harled.

The remains of a pier are located on the rivers edge, south of Dunmore Home Farm. A course of stones, $c \ 1m - 2m$ wide, runs from the grassy tree-lined river bank through mud flats into the Forth. The remains of the pier measure $c \ 50m$ long and is $c \ 3m$ high at its highest point. The pier is slightly curved. It is disused and has been allowed to fall into disrepair.

The cairn seems to be stabilised by the course dune grass covering it, traces of the pill box may remain underground. Several footpaths criss-cross the mound but are causing minimal damage.

The pillbox as observed on 1946 AP's, was of the classic type 22 hexagonal shape. The pillbox had either been sunken deep into the ground, or material had been piled up around it to roof level, and an attempt was made to disguise the roof with a covering of turf.. It is therefore possible that the pillbox is now totally buried in situ and that the centre of the cairn was destroyed during its construction.

The fact that these blocks run through woodland has contributed to their preservation, blocks were frequently blown up after the war, however if this is done in woodland concrete shrapnel embeds in the trees and makes them un-harvestable.




